HISTORY

Only slightly larger than Arkansas, Nepal is geographically stretched along the Great Himalaya Range and nestled between two giant neighbors—India and China (formerly known as Tibet). The Himalayan's most sophisticated urban cultures took shape there centuries ago in the three famous kingdoms of Kathmandu, Patan and Bhaktapur—home to world-class spiritual, artistic and architectural heritage. Nepal contains 8 of the world's 10 highest peaks including Mount Everest, Kanchenjunga and Anapurna. During trekking season beginning in late March, the streets of Kathmandu are filled with the excitement of international mountaineers preparing for their ascents. Nepal has a population of about 29.5 million with a life expectancy of 60 years. It is a spiritually tolerant country comprised of about 80% Hindus and 10% Buddhists. Even though Nepal is one of the poorest countries on Earth with a literacy rate under 50%, visitors are enchanted by the diversity, friendliness and good humor of its people.

POLITICS

In 1951 the Nepalese monarch ended the century-old system of rule by hereditary premiers and instituted a cabinet system of government. Reforms in 1990 established a multiparty democracy within the framework of a constitutional monarchy. An insurgency led by Maoists broke out in 1996 and a 10-year civil war ensued between the insurgents and government

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forces. Nepal ended the Maoist insurgency in November 2006 and established an interim government in January 2007. National elections in April 2008 formed a Constituent Assembly to serve as a parliamentary body and draft a new constitution by May 2010. The Constituent Assembly declared Nepal a federal democratic republic and abolished the monarchy in May 2008. The Maoists, who received a plurality of votes in the Constituent Assembly election formed a coalition government in August 2008.

Political demonstrations and unrest have occurred sporadically throughout Nepal in the past and may escalate due to recent political tensions. The Department of State warns US citizens of the potential risks of traveling to Nepal and urges caution when traveling in that country. The Department of State remains concerned about the security situation in Nepal. US citizens are advised to obtain updated security information before traveling and they should be prepared to change their plans on short notice.

TRAVEL DOCUMENTS

We suggest you make copies of your passport identification page, airline tickets, driver's license, and credit cards, and pack the copies in a place separate from where you carry the originals.

Passports: US citizens need a passport that is valid for six months from the date of completion of your trip.

Visa Fees & Cash Declaration: Tourist visas can be obtained at the immigration counter upon arrival at the Tribhuvan International Airport in Kathmandu. You will be charged a) US \$25 for 15 days multiple-entries; b) US \$40 for 30 days multiple-entries; c) US \$100 for 90 days multiple-entries. You must bring 2 passport photos and pay in USD cash or travelers checks. Tourist visas may also be obtained in advance through the Nepal Embassy in Washington, DC and must be used within 6 months from date of issue. Tourists carrying more than 2,000 USD or equivalent foreign currency are requested to declare in the Custom Declaration Form at the

Airport Exit Tax: Before departure from the Tribhuvan International Airport, all foreigners, regardless of their length of stay, must pay an airport exit tax (approximately \$21).

TRAVEL INSURANCE

We strongly recommend that you purchase travel insurance for unforeseen changes, problems or emergencies. Santa Barbara Travel (above) offers this service. Your insurance agent or credit card company may also provide travel insurance.

HEALTH CARE

Immunizations & Travel Medicine: Please consult your personal physician or local travel clinic to determine which precautions, immunizations, prescriptions and OTC medicines are advised for your safe travel. Common discomforts associated with long-distance travel and visiting third-world countries are sleep difficulties, sore throats, upper respiratory ailments and diarrhea. CDC Travelers' Health also offers information to assist travelers and their health-care providers in deciding the vaccines, medications and other measures necessary to prevent illness and injury during international travel. Travel Medical Kit: It is advised to bring a medical kit with basic items such as: treatments for headaches, fever, flu, cough, cold, allergies, sore throat, cold sores and diarrhea; sinus & nasal decongestants; antacids & laxatives; lip balm & eye care drops; motion sickness & sleeping aides (jet lag tablets, melatonin for time change); and antiseptic ointment & band-aids.

Medical Care in Kathmandu: The CIWEC Clinic Travel Medicine Center located across from the British Embassy in Kathmandu is one of the most famous destination travel clinics in the world. CIWEC was established in 1982 to meet the need for a Western standard clinic to treat foreign tourists, diplomats and aid workers in Nepal. The clinic is known internationally both for the high level of care afforded to patients, and for its reliable research and information about health risks in Nepal. PRACTICAL INFORMATION

Time Difference: Nepal is 5 hours + 45 minutes ahead of Greenwich Mean Time. [10 hours + 45 minutes ahead of EST and 13 hours + 45 minutes ahead of PST].

Altitude & Climate: The Kathmandu Valley is situated at 4446 ft above sea level. The country has a typical monsoonal, two-season year. The dry season runs from October to May and the hot, wet season runs from June to September. Fall (mid-September to November) and Spring (March to May) bring almost perfect weather and are the best times to visit. Following the monsoon, Fall months enjoy a green and lush countryside, the air is fresh and clear and the Himalayan views are near perfect. Spring months, the tail-end of the dry season, get a bit warmer during the day with occasional afternoon thunder showers. Temperatures during the dry season range from 70-85°F in the day and 45-59°F at night.



Currency: The currency of Nepal is the Nepali Rupee (NPR). The exchange rate as of May 2010 is 1 USD \approx 71.6 NPR. Major credit cards are generally accepted at the larger hotels, restaurants and shops. ATM machines are available at certain locations in Kathmandu. US dollars are accepted, so we suggest you carry US currency in small denominations for smaller purchases. Traveler's checks are easily cashed at hotels, banks & shops and are safer than cash. It's a good idea to keep your traveler's checks receipts in a separate location.

Communication Services: The Kathmandu Hyatt Regency Hotel offers wireless internet, international phone & fax services. Many internet cafes in Kathmandu also offer these services.

Electrical Current: Nepal's electrical current is 220V/50 cycles; therefore our 120V appliances (laptops, curling irons, etc.) require a transformer / converter plug.

What to Pack: International travel requires some common sense practices and safety begins when you pack. To help avoid becoming a target, it is advised not to dress so as to mark yourself as an affluent tourist. Expensive-looking jewelry and watches can draw the wrong attention and are best left at home. You may want to carry a shoulder-strap travel bag or fanny pack and leave expensive handbags at home.

Laundry service is available on a daily basis at the Kathmandu Hyatt Regency Hotel, thereby allowing you to pack light. Your wardrobe should be sturdy, casual and comfortable. Temperatures vary during the day and evening, so clothing that can be layered is the most suitable. Sturdy, comfortable shoes & sandals are a must for Kathmandu's rugged streets as we will be walking a lot. Slip-on shoes are advisable when visiting monasteries as they are removed before entering.

Nepalis are a very traditional and reserved people; therefore it is greatly appreciated to respect their custom of modest dress. Shorts and revealing clothes are unsuitable for women, below-the-knee capris, dresses & skirts are fine. Shorts are acceptable for men. Jeans, pants, shirts, t-shirts, sweaters and sweatshirts are suitable for both men & women. You may want to bring a swimsuit for the pool & spa and work-out clothes for the fitness center.
